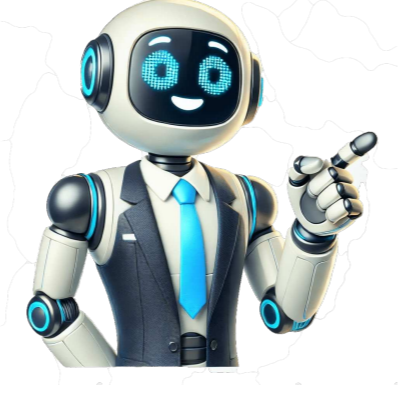

The satirical comedy film *Office Space* features two corporate consultants, Bob Slydell and Bob Porter, who lay off employees. Erin Brockovich stars Julia Roberts' character uncovering environmental contamination (water pollution) at a law firm. Superstoe follows the daily operations of Cloud 9, a fictional big-box retail store. Chotchkie's is the name of the restaurant chain where Jennifer Aniston's character works in *Office Space*. Boiler Room features a group of young stockbrokers involved in pump-and-dump stock scams. The Proposal stars Sandra Bullock's character forcing her assistant to marry her to avoid being deported, and they work in publishing. Customer Wars follows a call center dealing with difficult customers and corporate policies. The Founder tells the story of Ray Kroc building the McDonald's fast-food empire. Glengarry Glen Ross features real estate salesmen as the main characters, while *Thank You for Smoking* stars Aaron Eckhart's character as a corporate lobbyist for the tobacco industry. Finally, *The Big Short* features Steve Carell's character working at CNBC, and *Devil's Advocate* follows Keanu Reeves' character being recruited by the law firm Milton, Chadwick & Waters. The movie "Fun with Dick and Jane" features Jim Carrey's character losing his job at a major corporation called Globodyne, which was similar to Enron. In contrast, the film "The Hudsucker Proxy" features a protagonist who invents a product that makes the company millions - the hula hoop.
